Governor's Reception

The spotlight of the event was certainly Governor Lyndi Luttrull's speech at the end of the reception, when she highlighted important personal issues; most notably her stance on education and the role of the school to prepare students in responsibilities beyond the classroom.

"Any bill such as the 'Life 101 Class Required' bill or the 'Financial Freedom For Students' bill is something I'm in support of, because we need to be preparing our students for life after high school."

Governor Luttrull also threw her support to proposals which add agriculture to school curriculum and legislature to reduce distracted driving.

"One of the most popular cause of accidents in Texas is distracted driving...so I'm in full support of a bill that makes using a cellphone [while driving] illegal," Luttrull said.

Above all, the Governor implored the attendees to put the greater good above their own personal needs. "We all have our own personal values but we need to think on a larger scale and to think what is best for Texas instead."

In a recent interview, Ms. Shelby Lepley from Walker county, District 9, shared:

"So far it has been amazing. I'm really excited to see how it turns out as we go into the days where we are debating and presenting bills in different committees. I am really excited to see some of the bills come forward, especially things regarding agriculture and education within the classrooms, things protecting our rights as citizens our well being and our private property rights, and those covered in the constitution."

Lepley is interested in *Job Assimilation H.B.189/S.B. 389* which restricts Texas' welfare program in order to hold American citizens accountable to work for a pay check. Current Texas welfare checks would be disbanded. Local entities within our government would be able to ask for jobs from the state and once granted these jobs, would have their paychecks come from the government instead of having one from welfare. It would teach people accountability and self-reliance while supporting our local government entities.

"A few other bills of my interest are *Student Privacy in Public Schools H.B.157/S.B. 357*, any bills on agricultural education, private properties, and classrooms."

Lepley enjoys bills that bring up heat to the floor and positive debate. She encouraged us to remember our constitutional rights to our own property. This would be regarding bills such as *Limiting the Height of Shoe Heels to Three Inches H.B.* 257/S.B. 457 and *Don't Smoke in Texas H.B.* 243/S.B. 443.




Sponsors Lend a Helping Hand

The Young and Defenseless

At the age of 18, the citizens of the United States of America can vote and serve their country, though many people believe they should be able to defend themselves by carrying a concealed hand gun. This will be discussed many times throughout Texas 4-H Congress. As Concealed Hand Gun License for 18 year Olds H.B. 225/S.B. 425 states, This act shall give 18 year olds the ability to acquire a concealed handgun license in the state of Texas without being active military.

Texas laws currently state that only citizens 21 and over may obtain a concealed carry permit. Many people feel that these young adults are not responsible enough to handle a gun or don't want guns on college campuses. In reality, concealed carry states have the lowest crime rates in the country.

According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, the year after this law to conceal carry weapons passed, murder rates fell 50% faster than the national average. Assaults fell 250% faster in the second year. According to the same source, the facts show that concealed carry holders are 14 times less likely to commit a crime, and its five times less likely that, that crime will be violent. While crime is less likely to happen on a college campus in the United States, it is always a possibility.

Imagine being 18 and getting approached by someone who wants to do harm. You have no self defense and cannot fight back. What if you did have a way to fight back, a way to protect yourself and the ones surrounding you?

Use of Drones in Mosquito Management

Due to the recent outbreaks of the Zica virus more people have turned a fearful eye towards all the mosquitoes in our state, but are they really seeing the nature of the threat or are they just taking this at face value? H.B. 185/S.B. 385 is the proposal of using unmanned aircraft systems with UAS commonly known as drones, to locate, research, and deliver control systems to remote, rural, or underserved areas that are not protected by municipal systems. This is considered to be important because according to Sonja L. Swiger, assistant professor and Extension Entomologist, knowledge of diseases like the Zika and Chikukunga viruses could have been discovered and controlled even before the initial contact with humans. According to the Integrated Pest Management Extension Agent of Hale, Swisher, and Floyd counties, Blayne Reed, mosquitoes transmit diseases because of their evolutionized life cycle. They are considered to be classified in the insect order Diptera and display what is known as holometabolis which means they go through all the metabolis stages; egg, larvae, pupa, and adult. Contrary to popular belief, not all mosquitoes bite and not all the time, female mosquitoes are the only parts of the species that need a blood By: Ember Reed

meal and usually only once before laying a cluster of eggs. At all other stages of their life cycle, even the female mosquitoes, feed on nectar and pollen. The disease-transmitting problem originates from mosquito species that lay more than one cluster of eggs because of the amount of time the disease takes to cultivate within the insect. These species become infected by feeding on an infected blood meal before laying their eggs the disease then spreads through the insect and, finding the mosquito an unsuitable host, moves into the insect's salivary glands where it transmits to the next blood meal. This process usually takes three weeks. This bill would allow faster discovery and control of the affected species therefore preventing the spread and protecting our state's populace. Really, the only debatable section of the bill might be the use of drones, which is addressed by the bill's statement that all Federal regulations, restrictions, and permits will be acknowledged by the UAS used in the program. All in all, the bill seems a very feasible addition to our state's repertoire.

Education- No Public Schools Transgender Bathrooms Act

One of the most heated and frequent issues debated in 2016 was about transgender restrooms. The No Public Schools Transgender Bathrooms Act H.B. 134/S.B. 334 urges its own view on the issue to be implemented as law in Texas. Despite the clear opinion expressed by the act's title, the actual text of the bill doesn't seem to have quite as strong a position, stating in Section 2 that "the act shall give local School Boards authority over their buildings and how funds are used to maintain them." This text leaves the option for transgender bathrooms in public schools for individual School Boards to decide, shifting the debate away from bullying and alienation of transgender students versus student safety, and towards government choice versus schools' choice. However, the issue of transgender bathrooms still remains as hot a topic as ever.
