Let's look at his message.

Pledge	I dedicate all of my worldly goods to vie without self-pity
Allegiance	My love and my devotion
To The Flag	Our standard; Old Glory; a symbol of Freedom; wherever she waves there is respect, because your loyalty has given her dignity that shouts Freedom is everybody's job
Of The United	That means that we have all come together
States	Individual Communities that have united into 50 great states. Fifty individual communities with pride and dignity and purpose. All divided with imaginary boundaries, yet united to a common purpose and that is love for country
And To The Republic	Republic – a state in which sovereign power is invested in representatives chosen by the people to govern. And government is the people; and it's from the people to the leaders, not from the leaders to the people
For Which It Stands, One Nation Under God	One nation, meaning so blessed by God Indivisible Incapable of being divided
With Liberty	Which is Freedom; the right of power to live one's own life, without threats, fear or some sort of retaliation
And Justice	The principle or qualities of dealing fairly with others
For All	It's as much your country as it is mine

Staging of Ceremony:

The staging area is dark. The narrator is off stage or holds a light to read by and be seen by the audience. Post the flat in the center of the stage.

Supplies:

Four flashlights

NARRATOR:

From the Four Corners of the earth, they came. They carried a torch in Freedom's name. (Four 4-H'ers with flashlights enter from the four corners of the stage or room – these 4-H'ers are the four "Freedom" parts below.)

NARRATOR: Freedom of Speech

1st Freedom: and speak we must (shine flashlight on flag)

NARRATOR: Freedom of Worship

2nd Freedom: in God we trust (shine flashlight on flag)

NARRATOR: Freedom from Want

3rd Freedom: from weakness, from greed (shine flashlight on flag)

NARRATOR: Freedom from Fear

4th Freedom: is freedom indeed! (shine flashlight on flag)

NARRATOR: Let these freedoms be the beacons that call the home of the brave and the land of the free. To honor the flag is to honor the freedom for which it stands. Join me in the Pledge of Allegiance.



Making The Flag

Supplies:

- · Large Pot
- · Red, White and Blue Construction Paper, cut into squares
- · Sheet of star stickers
- · Large Wooden Spoon
- · American Flag, folded

Note: Before the ceremony place the folded flag in the pot.

Today we want to look at the ingredients that make up our flag.

First is the ingredient of Valor. Red is for Valor. For the courage of all women who with a dream in their hearts crossed the oceans to begin life in a free land. For the bravery of women who with hope and faith crossed the prairie and mountains of our vast land. For the steadfastness of those women who through all adversities shouldered the Country's burdens to emerge as strong individuals. (Put red paper squares in the pot) Our next ingredient is Purity. White is for Purity. For the integrity of all people whose fortitude wove the strands of diverse cultures into an integral national heritage. For the piety of all people whose faith formed the foundation upon which our Country was built and continues to grow. (Put white paper squares in the pot)

Our next ingredient is Justice. Blue is for Justice. For the foresight of all those women who created an atmosphere in which each of their children could develop to their fullest potential. For the perseverance of all those women who contributed their talents to further the development of our Country. (Put blue paper squares in the pot)

Our last ingredient is Dreams. Stars represent Dreams. For the dreams of the future that the generations of tomorrow may fulfill the promise of the past 200 years, so that the visions of our Forefathers will be revitalized and the future will hold hope and promise for all generations to come. (Put sheet of stars in the pot)

(Stir the pot) Stirring are the stories of my Stars and Stripes. I symbolize the soul of America, typifying her ideals and aspirations, her institutions and traditions. (Remove the flag from the pot) This flag, which we honor and under which we serve is the emblem of our unity, our power, and thought and purpose as a Nation.

The History Of Taps

Of all the military bugle calls, none is so easily recognized or more apt to render emotion than the call Taps. The melody is both eloquent and haunting and the history of its origin is interesting and somewhat clouded in controversy. In the British Army, a similar type call known as Last Post has been sounded over soldiers' graves since 1885, but the use of Taps is unique to the United States military, since the call is sounded at funerals, wreath-laying and memorial services.

Taps began as a revision to the signal for Extinguish Lights (Lights Out) at the end of the day. Up until the Civil War, the infantry call for Extinguish Lights was the one set down in Silas Casey's (1801-1882) Tactics, which had been borrowed from the French. The music for Taps was adapted by Union General Daniel Butterfield for his brigade (Third Brigade, First Division, Fifth Army Corps, Army of the Potomac) in July, 1862. Many people do not know the words to Taps. As we honor our military who have bravely served and given their lives during this month when we celebrate Memorial Day, let us reflect on these words.

Day is done, gone the sun, From the lake, from the hills, From the sky. All is well, safely rest, God is nigh.

Fades the light; And afar Goeth day, And the stars Shineth bright, Fare thee well; Day has gone, Night is on.

Thanks and praise, For our days, 'Neath the sun, Neath the stars, 'Neath the sky,
As we go, This we know,
God is nigh.
